As Canada faces a growing skills and talent gap, Canadian Business Hall of Fame Laureates become part of the solution. As role models, mentors and advocates for youth business education, they show youth the way to become tomorrow's business and community leaders.



## A. Charles Baillie, O.C.

Former Chairman and CEO  
TD Bank Financial Group

### b. 1939 Orillia, Ontario

Mr. Baillie, 66, began his career at TD in 1964. He progressed through a number of positions in the Bank, and in 1979 was charged with establishing TD's USA Division. Later, as Executive Vice President, Corporate and Investment Banking Group in Toronto, he was responsible for building TD Securities. In 1995 he was named President of the Bank and in 1997 became Chief Executive Officer. He added the role of Chairman of the Board in early 1998. Mr. Baillie retired as Chief Executive Officer on December 20, 2002 and as Chairman at the Annual Meeting on April 3, 2003.

During his career with TD Mr. Baillie oversaw the purchase of US-based Waterhouse Securities, Inc. in 1996, followed by the purchase of additional discount brokerage companies in the US and UK, and its acquisition of CT Financial Services Inc. in 2000. The acquisition of Canada Trust created Canada's largest retail bank, TD Canada Trust. Under Mr. Baillie's stewardship, TD rose from the fifth to the third largest bank in Canada.

Now a director of Canadian National Railway Company, Dana Corporation, George Weston Limited and Telus Corporation, Mr. Baillie is also Chancellor of Queen's University, President of the Art Gallery of Ontario's Board of Trustees and Honorary Chair of the Canadian Council of Chief Executives. As well, he is actively involved in a wide variety of not-for-profit boards, is a director of The Nature Conservancy of Canada and co-chaired its recent capital campaign and is Honorary Chair of The Shaw Festival's capital campaign.



Mr. Baillie has received numerous awards for his business and philanthropic achievements, and for his contribution to the debate on public policy. He serves on the Steering Committee of the Toronto City Summit Alliance, the Advisory Committee of Canada's National History Society and as a director of the Toronto Festival of Arts, Culture & Creativity.

Mr. Baillie graduated with an Honours Bachelor of Arts Degree in Political Science and Economics from the University of Toronto and earned an MBA from Harvard Business School. He received an Honorary Doctor of Laws from Queen's University and an Honorary Diploma from The Royal Conservatory of Music.

Mr. Baillie lives in Toronto with his wife, Marilyn, and has four grown children.



Stephen A. Jarislowsky, O.C., O.Q., LL.D.

Chairman and CEO  
Jarislowsky, Fraser Limited

b. 1925 Berlin, Germany

Stephen A. Jarislowsky was born in Berlin, Germany in September 1925. He attended public and high school in the Netherlands and France and then immigrated to the United States in 1941. He attended preparatory school in Asheville, North Carolina, studied mechanical engineering at Cornell University and then served in the US Army. He finished basic training and studied Japanese at the University of Chicago prior to serving in Counter-Intelligence in Japan after the War.

On return to the United States in 1946, he returned to the University of Chicago, graduating with an MA and Phi Beta Kappa Honours. He followed this with MBA studies at Harvard Business School, graduating in 1949.

He worked three years with Alcan Aluminium in Montreal and briefly returned to the United States prior to starting Jarislowsky, Fraser Limited in June of 1955 in Montreal.

Now Chairman and Chief Executive Officer and former president of the firm, for 50 years he has directed the growth of the company to become one of the largest and most successful investment management firms in Canada.

Mr. Jarislowsky has been active in other corporations, participated in educational, cultural and charitable activities of many kinds, has endowed fourteen University Chairs and contributes frequently to television, radio, magazines and newspapers.

His hobbies are his family, gardening, tennis, walking, good wines, art and literature.



He is a recipient of the Order of Canada, L'Ordre National du Québec, Honorary LL.D from Queens, University of Alberta, Université de Montréal, McMaster University, Concordia University, Assumption University as well as from L'Université Laval.

Joseph Segal, C.M., O.B.C., O.St.J.,  
LL.D. (HON.)

Founder  
Kingswood Capital Corporation

b. 1925 Vegreville, Alberta

Joseph Segal, born in Vegreville Alberta, spent 2 1/2 years with the Calgary Highlanders and served overseas during the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War. After settling in Vancouver in 1946 he went into the war surplus business. He then founded Fields Stores Limited. After taking Fields public in 1968 he added to the Fields store holdings by purchasing the 240 franchise retail stores of Marshall Wells wholesale hardware. In July 1976, Fields Stores acquired Zellers and Mr. Segal became Chairman. Over the next 3 years Zellers sales doubled without opening any new stores, and profitability increased substantially. In 1979 Zellers was purchased by the Hudson's Bay Company, and Mr. Segal became a major shareholder and joined the board of Hudson's Bay.

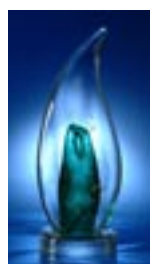
In 1979 Mr. Segal formed Kingswood Capital Corporation. Kingswood Capital is a Venture Capital provider, a real estate developer and an acquirer of companies for turn around. Kingswood's first purchase in 1979 was a men's clothing manufacturer which ultimately became Mr. Jax (Ladies) Fashions. During these years the company acquired many other clothing manufacturing companies.

Mr. Segal served on the board of Simon Fraser University for over 12 years and was Chancellor for 6 years. In 1989, Mr. Segal was one of the individuals instrumental in establishing the Simon Fraser University Harbour Center downtown campus. This project was a unique example of co-operation between the corporate sector and an educational institution. This was during his period on the Board of Simon Fraser University as Chairman of



the University Development Committee. Mr. Segal also chaired the capital campaign - for the creation of the Simon Fraser Wosk Centre for Dialogue, and was also a major contributor. In 2005 the SFU Segal Graduate School of Business opened in downtown Vancouver. The Segal family donated the heritage building for the school and was a major contributor to the capital campaign.

Mr. Segal maintains an open door to people from all walks of life. His family's selfless generosity is well known throughout the community. In May, 2005 both he and his wife were honored by Variety Club with their highest honor, the International Humanitarian Award.



## David F. Sobey, C.M.

Chairman Emeritus  
Sobeys Inc.

### b. 1931 Pictou County, Nova Scotia

Mr. David F. Sobey began his career with Sobeys more than 60 years ago. He worked part time in his early years and in 1955 he was appointed the manager of Sobeys first store in Halifax, returning to the company's head office in Stellarton in 1958 as Director of Merchandising and Advertising. Mr. Sobey served in many leadership roles in the growing company from Chief Operating Officer to Chairman and Chief Executive Officer. In 1996 he assumed the role of Chairman and retired in 2001 as Chairman Emeritus.

Mr. Sobey's industry and community service has included terms with the Boards of Directors of Junior Achievement of Canada, Retail Council of Canada, Food Marketing Institute (USA), The Food Business Forum CIES (Paris, France), and Tim Horton Children's Foundation. He served on the Board of Governors of Saint Mary's University and chaired the school's successful capital campaign in the mid-1990s.

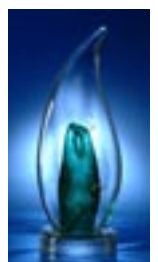
He is Chairman of The Sobey Foundation; The Frank H. Sobey Fund for Excellence in Business Studies; a Director of The Sobey Art Foundation, Atlantic Salmon Federation; a member of the National Advisory Council for Mount Allison University; and the Advisory Board of the Sobey School of Business at Saint Mary's University.

Mr. Sobey's past corporate directorships have included Hannaford Bros. Co. (Maine USA); Dominion Textile Inc., Provigo Inc., Versa Services Ltd., CHC Helicopter Corp. and Evangeline Financial Services Corp. He currently sits on the Board of Directors of Empire Company Limited and Sobeys Inc.



Mr. Sobey was made a Knight of the Golden Pencil in 1991, the Canadian grocery industry's highest honour, recognizing a career of outstanding contributions. In 1992, he received the Retail Council of Canada's Distinguished Canadian Retailer of the Year Award.

Mr. Sobey holds the degree of Doctor of Commerce (honoris causa) from Saint Mary's University, and in 1996 was appointed a Member of the Order of Canada.



## Donald C. R. Sobey

Chairman Emeritus  
Empire Company Limited

b. 1934 Pictou County, Nova Scotia

Donald Creighton Rae Sobey attended Queen's University where he graduated with a Bachelor of Commerce Degree in 1957.

Mr. Sobey joined his father, Frank H. Sobey and brothers Bill and David in the family business in 1958. He joined the Board of Empire Company Limited in 1963, was appointed President in 1969 and in 1985 attained the position of Chairman. In September 2004, he retired as Chairman of Empire Company Limited and was appointed Chairman Emeritus by the Board.

Empire Company Limited is a diversified Canadian company headquartered in Stellarton, Nova Scotia. Empire's key businesses include food distribution, real estate and corporate investment activities.

Mr. Sobey has served as Director on the Boards of many major corporations including Sobeys Inc., Crombie Properties Limited, Alliance Atlantis Communications Inc., The Toronto-Dominion Bank, High Liner Foods, Inc., and Stora Enso Port Hawkesbury Limited. He is currently a Member of the Canadian Group of The Trilateral Commission, and serves as a member of the Advisory Council of Queen's University. He is past Chair of Maritime Telegraph & Telephone Company Limited. He also currently serves on the Board of The World Wildlife Fund and chairs their Atlantic Council.

Mr. Sobey is Chairman of The Sobey Art Foundation, Chair of The National Gallery of Canada and serves on the Project Grand Jeté campaign cabinet for the National Ballet School.



In 2003, Mr. Sobey received the Keith Kelly Award for Cultural Leadership by the Canadian Conference of the Arts.

In 1999, Mr. Sobey established The *D & R Sobey Atlantic Leadership Scholarships* at his alma mater, Queen's University. Every year, six Atlantic Canadian students who demonstrate academic achievement and leadership are awarded a four-year scholarship, worth \$14,000 per year. He and his son Rob serve as trustees of the fund.

Mr. Sobey received the degree of Doctor of Laws (honoris causa) from Dalhousie University in October of 1989 and in June of 2001 received an Honorary Diploma from the Nova Scotia Community College.
